

# Pilot's shock film on toxic jet pollution set for release

uncover the truth behind allegations that air supplies contain toxic, unfiltered fumes from jet engines.

The Storrington-born former airline pilot spent 19 years as a commercial pilot and says his own health has been damaged by fumes, rendering him unable to fly.

For the past seven years he has researched the subject, and has also written a novel, 'Toxic Airlines', published in April 2007, which addresses the same issue.

Plans are also afoot to turn the book into a movie, with a script already written and finance currently being sought.

Cabin air is drawn from the engines of aircraft and is unfiltered, and in the 93-minute documentary, Loraine investigates the possibility that serious health and safety risks are caused by neurotoxins, carcinogens and other hazardous chemicals that can leak from engines.

The film will be aired at the Capitol in North Street on Monday March 31, and there will also be a question and answer session with Mr Loraine on the same day.

Speaking to the County Times, he said: "The central problem is that the air passengers and crew breathe in is taken from the engine and unfiltered and can sometimes be contaminated by toxic air.

"A lot of these chemicals are odourless, and on aeroplanes there are no detection

systems - it's a disgrace, and passengers are never told when they are exposed."

He added: "People can see that this is an issue that affects everyday travelling.

"Now what we are really hoping is that there will be a Royal Commission to investigate these matters."

The film will air at the Capitol at 2.30pm and 8pm, with a question and answer session with Mr Loraine following screenings.
